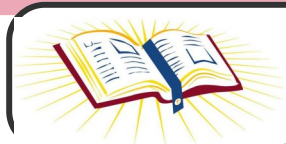
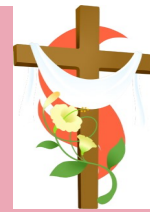

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This month we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. The date of Easter this year is April 9th. And every year when we approach the Day of Resurrection, I think about how many non-believers cannot find it in themselves to believe that Christ is risen. Yes, we would have to believe that when it comes to believing in Christianity, the biggest obstacle for many people in the world is the Easter message, that on the third day Jesus rose from the dead.

People can usually appreciate that Jesus was a great teacher. People can usually appreciate that Jesus was filled with compassion and care for those around him. People can usually get that far. People can usually see Jesus as a great man. But, believing in the resurrection of Jesus, well, you might as well tell people that there are such things as the Abominable Snowman and the Loch Ness monster.

But when confronted by such skepticism, I try to come at the truth of the resurrection from another way. And that other way is to say that death and resurrection are all around us. You can't avoid it, and so why would we not say that Jesus is risen from the dead? In short, the resurrection is not so much an obstacle of faith to overcome, as a reality that hits in the face in every direction. Let me explain what I mean.

First, there is the daily cycle of sleep and wakefulness. Many animals including humans, of course, divide their daily routine between sleep and wakefulness. We lay down, we close our eyes, and we fall asleep. And after a period of sleep, we awake. And, we must admit that in that routine of sleep and wakefulness, there is a definite image of death and resurrection.

Second, there is the yearly cycle of seasons. Many creatures in many places on earth during the fall and winter months experience a sort of death. Plants and trees go dormant. Certain animal species hibernate. And then come the time of spring and summer, life is in a very powerful sense reborn. And again, we must admit that in that yearly cycle of winter and spring, there is another definite image of death and resurrection.

Third, there is the life cycle of stars. Stars form from gas clouds that have coalesced, and suddenly those gases ignite and voila, we have stars. Those same stars after billions of years of shining die off, they implode, and those same stars expel the gases and material inside them into the cosmos to be used for future starts. And so, again, there is a sort of death and resurrection that accompanies the life cycle of stars. Of course, there is also the image of our own sun, which looks as though it dies at the end of each day, when it descends on the western horizon, only to be resurrected the next morning in the eastern horizon.

There are any number of other examples of death and resurrection all around us. But these few should be enough to emphasize the point that the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is not so much an obstacle of faith for us to overcome, as much as it is just one more example of what God is doing all around us all the time. The world we live in and the universe we inhabit is suffused with "death and resurrection."

And so, the question that we should probably be asking is not how we can help others believe in the death and resurrection of Jesus, as much as why did God create so many examples of death and resurrection around us? The answer, of course, is that God must want us to see some greater purpose for those examples, that being to realize that our individual death is not an end. If the world and the universe, let alone Jesus' own death and resurrection, teaches us anything, it is that there is great evidence that something will come after death. And that something is new life. And thus there is great reason to have an abundance of hope. And that is the Easter message, at least for me.

Death does not seem to be the final word within the workings of the universe. Resurrection, rebirth, new life—these are the things that win out. Thanks be to God, and Happy Easter to you all.

About Worship

When I was growing up, my parents were part of a dinner group, consisting of a number of couples, all of whom were good friends with one another. And my parents and their friends would sometimes do what was called a "Progressive Dinner Party ." It was such that on the evening of the Progressive Dinner Party, one couple would have the dinner group over for hors d'oeuvres. And then the dinner group would proceed to another couple's house for the main course. And then the dinner party would proceed to yet another couple's house for dessert. It was a "Progressive Dinner Party" because the couples progressed from one house to the next.

This Holy Week we are going to do a similar thing. We are going to have a "Progressive Holy Week," in which we will go from one church to another to another as we journey with Christ to his suffering, death, and resurrection. With that said, we will begin by gathering for worship at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in New Kingstown for Maundy Thursday service. The address is 30 West Main Street, New Kingstown. Worship will be at 6:00pm on April 6th. Worship will include an Agape Meal. At the end of worship, there will be the stripping of the altar. There will be no worship at Our Saviour that evening.

The next evening is Good Friday, and we will have our traditional Tenebrae Service at Our Saviour beginning at 7:00pm. This service will include a number of hymns and readings focusing on the suffering and death of Christ our Lord. As the service progresses, candles will be extinguished and electric lights will be turned off, so that by the conclusion of the service, it will be completely dark in the nave. The Paschal Candle will be recessed out, and the congregation will leave in silence. There will be no service at St. Stephen's that evening.

The next evening is Holy Saturday, and my wife's church, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, will be conducting their usual Easter Vigil service. That will begin at 7:00pm. Good Shepherd is located at 3700 Rutherford Road in Paxtang. The service includes several readings that recall the faithfulness of God to God's people throughout the history of faith. The service also includes the remembrance of baptism, and the first celebration of Holy Communion in the Easter Season.

Finally, on Easter Sunday, we will have our regular Sunday worship schedule. Worship will be at 9:00am at Our Saviour and 11:00am at St. Stephen's. It will be a glorious day in which we rejoice in the resurrection of our Lord. At Our Saviour, we will celebrate with several of our young people that day as they receive their first communion.

So please plan to join us for our Progressive Holy Week. The journey together promises to be a blessing to our faith lives, as we worship with our sisters and brothers in Christ from St. Stephen's and Good Shepherd.

A Word on Stewardship

I want to inform you that envelopes will soon be available in the pew racks for special offerings. These envelopes will have a label on the front of them, such that you can note whether you would like to designate monies toward certain church expenses/funds, namely, Bulletins, Benevolence, Christian Education, Building Fund, and Memorial. There will also be a blank line, in which you can write-in where you want your special offering to go.

These offering envelopes are not meant to replace your weekly offering envelopes. We encourage you to keep up with your regular giving to support the congregational budget. But the special envelopes are a way to supplement your regular giving and earmark dollars to offset particular costs in the life of Our Saviour. What are those costs? Well, "Bulletins" is pretty self-evident. There is a cost to generate a bulletin each week, which includes the cover, Celebrate insert, additional paper inserts, and printing expense. "Benevolence" is the money Our Saviour gives toward Mission Support, which provides for the greater mission within our synod, and the larger church known as the ELCA. "Christian Education" is again self-evident. This entails all things related to the education of our young people as well as adults, mostly it includes at present the cost of curriculum. "Building Fund" is the monies that are collected for larger projects related to property, which might include things like the maintenance of the church roof or the parking lot. And Memorial is the monies collected for other projects in the life of the church, usually given in memory of an individual.

In short, there are particular expenses of the church, those things named above, which if they are not funded by special offerings, are paid for from the regular giving. It would be great if you have a particular passion like Christian Education or Benevolence, that you might give an additional special offering to help offset those costs. Just something to think about in relation to the stewardship of our personal resources.

We have successfully revived Sunday School for the children of Our Saviour. The children have a lesson, complete a craft and enjoyed a snack. As a reminder, children's Sunday School class will be held on the first Sunday of the month during the service. **The next class will be Sunday, April 2nd.**

Dear Padre,

So what were some of the best things you saw on your trip to Spain and France?

Dear Travel Enthusiast,

There were so many great things my family and I experienced on our trip. But, I think the best way to talk about the trip is by talking about UNESCO World Heritage sites. Now, we are probably all familiar with the National Park Service. We are familiar with all those places in the United States that fall under the umbrella of the N.P.S., including places like the Statue of Liberty, Yellowstone, Monticello, and so forth.

Well, aside from the N.P.S., there are a large number of important cultural sites throughout the world. UNESCO stands for the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization. Its mission is to contribute to the building of a culture of peace, the eradication of poverty, sustainable development and intercultural dialogue through education, the sciences, culture, communication, and information. In short, UNESCO, as I see it, is about lifting up important places in the world to help us heal and grow as a human species. So, Auschwitz-Birkenau Concentration Camp is a UNESCO site. Wartburg Castle, where Luther translated the Bible into German is a UNESCO site. So on and so forth.

So, in Spain, we saw several UNESCO sites including La Sagrada Familia, which is a basilica in Barcelona. It is the most visited landmark in Spain. It is the best example of Antonio Gaudi's architectural genius. It is a church that is still in the process of being built. We also saw Park Güell, another UNESCO site, which was designed by Gaudi. It is Gaudi's version of an English garden, but parts of it look like something out of a Dr. Suess book. We also experienced a little bit of Las Fallas, which is a festival that takes place in Valencia. It is in honor of St. Joseph. This festival includes numerous light shows, floats, fireworks, and a lot of partying. And it goes on for weeks. Interestingly enough, this festival is considered an "intangible" UNESCO site. In other words, Las Fallas is not so much a physical place, even though it takes place in Valencia, as it is an event. So, UNESCO recognizes not just places but events and even foods as world heritage sites. One of the foods we enjoyed in Spain is paella, which is a rice based dish with all sorts of seafood included. Our dish had chicken, since my wife is allergic to shellfish. The main spice in the dish is saffron. Paella is being considered for inclusion as an "intangible" UNESCO site. We also saw the Serra de Tramuntana on the Spanish island of Mallorca. These mountains are also a UNESCO site, and they are simply spectacular. We also toured the Cathedral-Basilica de Santa Maria in the city of Palma on the island of Mallorca. This basilica is another UNESCO site and boasts the world's largest nave. It is also home to the Song of the Sybil, which is a liturgical drama and Gregorian chant, the lyrics of which comprise a prophecy describing the Apocalypse. The song has been sung on the eve of Christmas in this church nearly uninterrupted since medieval times. The song is another "intangible" UNESCO site.

In France, we visited Millau, where we saw the largest suspension bridge in the world. Although the bridge itself is not a UNESCO site, it serves as a gateway to the Causses and Cevennes, the landscape of which is a UNESCO site. And in France, we also saw the double-walled city called Carcassonne, which is another UNESCO site. It is an absolutely beautiful city. We wanted to see this city, because our family plays a German-made game by Hans Jurgen called Carcassonne.

So that gives you a little insight into what we experienced on our trip to Spain and France. At some point, I hope to share our trip through a presentation of pictures and commentary. So, there will be more sharing to come at a later time. Thanks for your question.

Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Saviour Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting Wednesday, February 8, 2023

Members Present: Pastor Joel Petruschke, Antonetta Fleming, President, Brad Neil, Vice-President, Jim Lubrecht, Treasurer, Jeanette Logan, Secretary, Penny Zimmerman and Dawne Veet, (via ZOOM).

Members Absent: Steve Barron

At 6:40 pm the meeting was called to order and Pastor Joel offered a word of prayer.

The minutes from the Council Meeting on January 11, 2023 were edited and approved. Pastor Joel made a motion to approve the minutes and Brad Neil seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Jim reviewed the finance questions that Council had for him from our January 11, 2023 meeting. His responses to those questions are as follows.

Jim did not transfer any money from the Current Fund to the Fund Raising Account. The amount spent for Germanfest in 2021 was \$1,728.28.

The starting balance for the Memorial Fund in January, 2022 was \$79,027.16 and the ending balance in 2022 was \$87,474.90.

The donations are all at zero for the Budget for 2023 (JIM CAN ANSWER THIS AT THE MEETING). Benevolence comes out of the General Fund and our payment to Synod is \$6,000.00. It was noted that perhaps we consider bringing back special Benevolence Envelopes for members to use for their contributions to this fund. This was something that had been done many years ago.

Jim reviewed the financial report information with Council. In January of 2023, Jim took out \$5,000.00 out of the Current Fund Mutuals to cover expenses. This week, Jim put the money back into the Current Mutual Fund Mutuals. Jim will hold another Finance Committee meeting soon and he will advise Council when the meeting has been scheduled. Jim believes people are giving more. Penny and Jim are counting the Easter Egg sales money every Tuesday at church. If Penny or Jim are unable to be present on a given week, Anneke volunteered to be present to help count the money.

Worship and Music: Report submitted and reviewed by Council.

Finance: A report was submitted and reviewed by Council.

Pastor's Report: A report was submitted and reviewed by Council. Pastor Joel informed Council that Barb received information pertaining to the Primary Day Election on Tuesday, May 16th. The election workers will come in to set up the polling machines on Monday, May 15th during the morning or evening hours. Discussion by Council was had about possibly doing another baked goods sale and perhaps hot dogs, soda and water. Sign-up sheets would be put in the Narthex to ask members to volunteer to donate baked goods. There will be another election on November 7th. Discussion ensued about perhaps asking members to donate crockpots with different soups to be sold on a takeout basis at the election.

Old Business:

Research on cost effective ways to lower our expenses: Dawne would like to see our expenses and try to determine where we can make some changes to save money. She is willing to meet with Jim. Jim mentioned that he can provide Dawne with detailed reports from Quick Books to help her determine where we might be able to save the church money.

Sundays and Seasons: Barb says we aren't currently using Sundays and Seasons and perhaps it would be wise for us to discontinue the license. Hope Bowling would be someone to talk to about this. Jim and Anneke will look at all of the committees and their expenses, i.e. Administration, Worship and Music and Maintenance.

Attendance Statistics: Can Barb check on comparisons of attendance from last year and 2021? Pastor Joel reached out to Barb during the meeting and she reported back to him that in January, 2022, the records show 43 members present. In January of 2023 there were between 42 and 47 in attendance on a Sunday.

Outdoor address sign and Marquis: Anneke informed Council that Dave is currently in New Jersey but he informed her that once the temperatures stay at a consistent 50 or 60 degrees he will begin working on the long, tan address sign. She will provide an update on repairing the Marquis sign.

Visioning Update: Dawne has started the process of going through the visioning responses but issues with her computer have caused a delay. She will send an email to Council when it has been completed.

Christmas Tree Storage Bag: The bag Dawne thought she would be able to donate is no longer available but she will check online at Target to find one suitable for us to use.

New Business:

New Roof Repair Quotes: Two quotes to repair the church's roof were provided for us to keep on file at the church. At the present time, thankfully we are not in need of roof repairs but we will keep the estimates on file in the event the need arises to repair the roof.

Special Congregational Meeting: Reviewed minutes from the Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January, 29, 2023. Anneke made a motion to accept the minutes and Pastor Joel seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Interim Contract Meeting with St. Stephen's Lutheran Church, New Kingston, PA: Pastor Joel, Jim Lubrecht, and Anneke Fleming had a meeting on Saturday, February 4, 2023, with Council Members from St. Stephen's Lutheran Church to discuss the Letter of Agreement for Pastoral Services and worship time for both churches. After the meeting, Pastor Joel contacted Reverend Beth Martini, Assistant to the Bishop of Lower Susquehanna Synod, to update the Letter of Agreement for Pastoral Services with the changes that were raised at this meeting.

Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, February 12, 2023: A vote on the Interim Agreement for Pastoral Services will take place. A change in worship time will be discussed but not voted on at this time.

Anneke sent an email to Tom Burson, Council President of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church suggesting the possibility of St. Stephen's having their worship service begin at 8:15 am and Our Saviour having its service begin at 10:15 am. This would be a 45-minute time change for each church making it equitable. Questions from the Congregation pertaining to this agreement between Pastor Joel and St. Stephen's Lutheran Church will be addressed and answered at the meeting.

Points to consider:

Pastor Joel may not be hired by St. Stephen's Lutheran Church.

There will be a re-evaluation after the 6 month period.

The contract begins on March 21, 2023 and ends on September 21, 2023.

Our focus is to help other Christians.

Our church has a large financial deficit and this additional \$15,000 will help us.

St. Stephen's will be responsible for paying travel expenses directly to Pastor Joel.

ELCA Worker's Compensation Coverage that Our Saviour already pays for will cover Pastor Joel during his time at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church.

St. Stephen's is responsible for a supply pastor during Pastor Joel's vacations.

Pastor Joel's vacation and continuing education will remain the same for Our Saviour.

St. Stephen's is in need of an organist and they have asked about Mitchell's availability.

Holy Week Services - The possibility of having progressive services throughout the week is being discussed with switching back and forth between churches. On Easter Sunday Pastor Joel would preach at both churches.

At 9:15 pm Pastor Joel made a motion to adjourn the meeting and Brad seconded the motion. The motion carried. Our next Council Meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 8, 2023 at 6:30 pm.

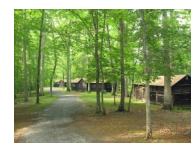
