Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

October is the time of year when we remember specifically our Lutheran Heritage. For it was after all during the month of October in the year 1517 that the Lutheran Reformation began. It was in October 1517 when Luther posted his *95 Theses* that started the events that led to the formation of the Lutheran Church and other Protestant denominations. So October is a most appropriate time to remember our Lutheran Heritage.

And one of the aspects of our Lutheran Heritage, and no small aspect at that, is the notion that "truth is found in paradox." Now, for those who don't know, a paradox is a seemingly absurd or self-contradictory statement or proposition. Here are some examples: "Less is more;" "The enemy of my enemy is my friend;" "The beginning of the end;" and "Earn more money by spending it."

In the movie An American President starring Michael Douglas and Annette Benning, there is a scene toward the end of the movie where Douglas (as the President of the United States) gives a speech during a press conference. His speech in part includes these words: "America isn't easy. America is advanced citizenship. You've gotta want it bad, 'cause it's gonna put up a fight. It's gonna say, 'You want free speech? Let's see you acknowledge a man whose words make your blood boil, who's standing center stage and advocating at the top of his lungs that which you would spend a lifetime opposing at the top of yours.' You want to claim this land as the land of the free? Then the symbol of your country cannot just be a flag. The symbol of your country also has to be one of its citizens exercising his right to burn that flag in protest. Now show me that, defend that, celebrate that in your classrooms." That, Sisters and Brothers in Christ, that speech is paradox at its finest.

And so again, I reiterate, "Truth is found in paradox." And Martin Luther understood this very well. He was adept as spouting paradoxes. For instance, Luther said, "A Christian is both simultaneously saint and sinner." We are saints because of baptism, and yet we still struggle with sin throughout our lives. And Luther said, "The power of God is hidden in suffering." This is nowhere better seen than at the cross. God's power to redeem the world from sin and death is on display in all its glory in the violent and gruesome execution of his Son Jesus. And Luther said, "The Bible contains both law and Gospel. The Bible contains both judgment and grace." Often these two are conveyed in the same words in the Bible. I liken this truism to a pastor who tells his whole congregation "thanks" for helping during such and such a service event. Those in the congregation who had helped at the event would hear those words and feel blessed by the pastor's word of thanks. Those in the congregation who hadn't helped at the event would hear the pastor's words and no doubt feel a twinge of guilt. That is Law and Gospel happening at the same time. I could go on and on with Luther's use of paradox, but I think I made my point.

So when we look at life around us, I think it is well worth our effort to take note of those places where there is contradiction, where there is a sense of the absurd. And in that paradox we see truth. One such example of contradiction and absurdity, is the image on television of a person using a push broom to sweep up a street when all around that person are demolished buildings. I have seen that image more than once during the war in Ukraine. It is absurd. It is a paradox—trying to clean up with so much destruction all around. But truth is right there for the viewing. For what is God about, and what has God implanted in human beings, but a need for order. That is what God does in Creation: God puts light and darkness in their places, making "day" and "night"; God puts water and dry land in their places, making "seas" and "earth"; so on and so forth. So truth is found where there is absurd, contradictory, paradoxical things. This is what the writer of that speech from *An American President* is getting at, too.

As we think about our Lutheran Heritage this month, think about where truth is often revealed in the world around us, in those places where paradox is very evident. To know truth is to be on the watch for paradox.

About Worship

So, imagine the world's population compressed to a global village consisting of just 100 people. What would the village look like with respect to faith orientation? Well, 33 villagers would be Christians, 20 would be Muslims, 13 would be Hindus, 6 would be Buddhists, 2 would be atheists, 12 would be non-religious, and the remaining 14 would be members of other religions. Of those 33 Christian villagers, about half would be Catholic (17), over a third would be Protestant (12), and a little over 10% would be Orthodox (3). The remaining would be other denominations.* And, if you were curious, just 1 of those 100 people would be Lutheran.

Here are some other figures pertaining to the village:

61 villagers would be Asian (of that, 20 would be Chinese and 17 would be Indian), 14 would be African, 11 would be European, 9 would be Latin or South American, 5 would be North American, and none of the villagers would be from Australia, Oceania, or Antarctica.

At least 18 villagers would be unable to read or write but 33 would have cellular phones and 16 would be online on the Internet.

27 villagers would be under 15 years of age and 7 would be over 64 years old.

There would be an equal number of males and females.

There would be 18 cars in the village.

63 villagers would have inadequate sanitation.

30 villagers would be unemployed or underemployed while of those 70 who would work, 28 would work in agriculture (primary sector), 14 would work in industry (secondary sector), and the remaining 28 would work in the service sector (tertiary sector). 53 villagers would live on less than two U.S. dollars a day.

One villager would have AIDS, 26 villagers would smoke, and 14 villagers would be obese.

By the end of a year, one villager would die and two new villagers would be born so thus the population would climb to 101.

A Word on Stewardship

For this stewardship article, I want to tell you about a lecture I was listening to, a lecture given by the former president of Morehouse College, Dr. Robert Franklin. And in this lecture he outlines five "WELLS" that he encouraged the students of Morehouse to pursue. The five WELLS are well-spoken, well-read, well-dressed, well-traveled, and well-balanced.

Well-spoken means that an individual should have a point when they speak, and should be able to express themselves so that they are understood, and that when that individual speaks people want to hear what they have to say. A well-spoken person should be able to talk confidently both in one-on-one situations and be able to speak to large audiences. Good speakers can incorporate humor and can reference other people when they speak.

Well-read means that an individual should be familiar with works from a wide variety of genres. An individual should read history, fiction, poetry, philosophy, art and so on. And a well-read person should not just have a large list of books he or she has read, but that individual should be able to speak intelligently about those books. A well-read individual should be able to critique what they read. And so, being well-read feeds into being well-spoken.

Being well-dressed does not only say something about how you view yourself, but also says something about how you view people around you. A well-dressed individual shows a certain care and attention to one's appearance, while at the same time is a sign of respect toward others. One should not be vain when it comes to how one looks. Instead, it is more about respect toward other people.

Well-traveled is essential because travel allows one to see the world outside one's own community. Traveling to new places helps open one's eyes to opportunities and to the needs of others. Experiencing cultures different from our own humbles us, such that we realize that not everyone speaks our language or sees the world in the same way. And that is okay, and in fact, that should be celebrated.

Well-balanced means that one should develop compassion, civility, integrity, and good listening skills. Being well-balanced helps us appreciate differences, as opposed to thinking everyone should fit into a particular box, or act and behave in a particular way. Being well-balanced means that learning should be eclectic, that we should be open to adopting insights from here and there.

Those are Franklin's five WELLS, and I wonder if in your experience you would add or replace other WELLS into the mix. One other WELL that Franklin suggested is well-versed in various kinds of food. I find that one of particular interest, because as Franklin rightly observes you can tell a lot about a person and a culture by the food they eat or don't eat.

As we think about these various WELLS, I can't help but think about how the WELLS help shape our lives for the better. In fact, these WELLS help us to be better stewards of our person. So, consider again the value you put on certain WELLS in your own life, and plunge deep into the water of those WELLS.

Dear Padre,

For this Dear Padre article, I want to turn it on its end and ask you, the members of Our Saviour, a question. And the question is this: "What are your long term plans for the future?" Maybe you are thinking about a special vacation in the future. Maybe you are already making plans for the holidays. Maybe you are thinking about your plans for retirement.

I was thinking about this question as my family gets ready again to make sauerkraut. For many years now, my family has made sauerkraut around Columbus Day weekend. Of course, it takes longer than just a weekend. So, I should say that my family prepares the cabbage on Columbus Day. We shave the cabbage, add salt and water, and then let the cabbage sit in the brine in crocks for several weeks. Around Thanksgiving, it is ready to be canned. And then jars of sauerkraut are divvied out to family and friends. And then come New Year's, my family uses some of the sauerkraut for our pork and sauerkraut dinner. So, my family this month will begin our long term plans for New Year's when we prepare the cabbage for sauerkraut.

I bring all this up, and I ask what long term plans you have, because our God is a God of long term plans. Think about God's plan to send a Messiah to God's people. That plan was formulated back in the Old Testament. The prophets prophesied the coming of a Messiah. And it was only centuries later that Jesus arrived on the scene as God's Messiah. Or think about God's promise to Abraham that his offspring would become a great nation. Again, that plan only was fulfilled centuries later when the people of Israel entered the Promised Land and became the Jewish nation. Yes, God seems to like to make long term plans, much longer than a few months to make sauerkraut for New Year's, and even much longer than the years one prepares for one's retirement. No, God works in scales of time that span centuries.

Even now, God is no doubt making plans for our good and not our harm, to give us a future and a hope (Jeremiah 29:11). And as God's people, we hope and pray God's plans include seeing beyond nations that rise up in war with one another. And we hope and pray God's plans include seeing a world where people are not hungry and destitute. And we hope and pray God's plans include a planet that is not struggling with extreme heat, violent storms, and destructive wildfires. Let us all hope and pray that God's good plans come to fruition sooner than later, and let us do what we can to help make God's plans a reality.

In truth, I hope and pray that our long term plans may include God's plans for us and for creation. I hope and pray that we get on board with the plans God is making. So, again, I ask, "What are your long term plans for the future?"



Throughout the world and in our nation, prayers of faith, hope and charity continue to rise, in response to the COVID pandemic and national and world crises. These crises are felt right here in Susquehanna Township. Many of our Susquehanna Township neighbors face daily challenges, one of which is **HUNGER**.

With more than half of the students in our school district eligible for free and reduced lunches, a **crisis of** HUNGER exists in our community. In response, HANNA's Pantry, a member agency of the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank and partner of Susquehanna Township School District, has been providing nutritious foods to children individuals. children, individuals, families, and senior citizens who reside in Susquehanna Township since 2019, and throughout the pandemic.

Today, we operate as a drive through grocery pickup with choice options, and have **provided groceries for over 40,000 individuals** since we opened. Rising food costs have escalated families' need to put food on their tables, and many are asking for help for the first time in their lives. In August 2022, we provided groceries for more than 475 families, DOUBLE the number served in August 2021.
