Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Lately, I have been hearing the word "trauma" quite a bit. I attended the Trauma Training 101 class sponsored by Family Promise not long ago. And then, Bishop Dunlop talked about trauma at the recent pastors' Zoom meeting. In particular, the Bishop described the ongoing pandemic in terms of trauma. Trauma can be defined as "an emotional response to a terrible event."

During that meeting with the Bishop, he asked us pastors three questions: 1) What have been your challenges during this pandemic? 2) What surprise blessings have emerged for you from the pandemic? and 3) How have you grown spiritually during the pandemic?

These questions are not just helpful for us as individuals, but I also think they are questions worth considering as a congregation. Here is how I would answer the questions with respect to our church.

What have been the challenges during this pandemic? We have not been able to celebrate communion as we had in the past. We have not seen all of our members in worship; several members are still apprehensive about in-person worship. We have had to cancel egg making last year and have had to scale back our GermanFest event last year, and so our outreach to the community has been affected.

What surprise blessings have emerged from the pandemic? We have added livestream and Zoom capabilities. We have begun a relationship with Epiphany Lutheran Church. We have had the opportunity to change the carpet in the sanctuary and to paint the sanctuary and fellowship hall.

How have we grown spiritually during this pandemic? This question is harder to answer because it is different for everyone. Nonetheless, our congregation has begun to conduct Bible Study with the folks at the Manor at Oakridge. We have reestablished Adult Sunday School on Sunday mornings. We have been holding Confirmation Class with students from both Our Saviour and Epiphany. We participated in the Live Nativity at the Linglestown Christkindl Markt, a new endeavor for several of our members. Many folks in our church have taken on new responsibilities in the life of the church because circumstances have made it necessary to do so. Our congregational council is working to be more engaged in the ministries of the church, particularly by serving as liaisons to the various committees. All of these things influence our spiritual well-being, whether through service or learning or worship.

Now, back to the word "trauma." In talking about "trauma" with others, I am finding that there is a feeling that the pandemic is not so much a "traumatic" experience. For some, it surely is. But, for many people the pandemic has just been terribly exhausting. Regardless, the three questions posed by the Bishop are helpful. And these questions I would ask you to consider in your own life. In my opinion, the third question is most important: How have you grown spiritually during this pandemic? How would you answer that question.? Has your relationship with God grown in certain ways? Why or why not?

I guess, the point of this whole exercise (that is, examining these three questions) is self-reflection. It is one thing to go through life, and through a pandemic, without necessarily thinking about it. But, it is another thing altogether to consider who we are during the journey. Who have we become during this pandemic? How have we been changing? Are those changes good or bad? Only when we do the important work of self-reflection can we assess truly who we are and who we want to become.

Thank you for taking some time to read this article and entertaining these questions. I hope you your self-reflection is a blessing to your life. God is good. All the time.

About Worship

Opportunities for worship. This is something of which the church constantly needs to be mindful. Indeed, we need to find ways by which people are able to worship. For instance, one of things I hear often from folks about Sunday morning worship is that it is too early. Now granted, we did move our worship time back to 9:30am, but we once had a 10:45am worship time which was more agreeable for some of our members. Some of our members need more time in the morning to get themselves ready for worship. At least, that is what I hear from some folks.

And so, I do remind those folks that our worship is livestreamed. Thus, if such persons are unable to be present in person at the 9:30am service, there is still the option to view the service from their home without having to be "presentable." And, if 9:30am is still too early to watch the worship at home, I also remind folks that the service is recorded, so it can be watched at one's leisure at any time.

Now, many of the same folks who are unable to be present in person at worship at 9:30am are also unable to watch the service via computer. The reason being, they just don't have access to a computer or are not technosavvy. Or, they just don't like to "watch" worship. Worship is not worship unless it is in person. So, I have another opportunity for those persons who are unable to be with us on Sunday morning at 9:30am, or who don't have computer access, or who don't want to simply watch worship.

This past month I began conducting a monthly worship at the Manor at Oakridge off Linglestown Road. The residents had asked for a service whereby they could receive Holy Communion. Unfortunately, there had not been a service at the Manor in which the sacrament was offered. So, I agreed. Now, the plan is to hold a communion service once a month on the fourth Sunday of the month. The service will be at 3:45pm and will be in the chapel at the Manor at Oakridge. I shared all this with you so as to offer another opportunity for worship. Here is then a service later in the day. Here is a service in person. Here is a service whereby there is the preaching of God's Word and the administering of Holy Communion. Now, some might say, "But I like to worship at my own church at Our Saviour." To which, I have to throw up my hands and say, "I am trying to do my best here to provide every opportunity for worship to meet your needs. Please work with me."

The relationship we are developing with the Manor at Oakridge is actually quite interesting. We have already been conducting bimonthly Bible Study at the Manor. The plan was to incorporate more folks into our regular Bible Study. Since we were only getting a few out for Bible Study at Our Saviour, it was decided to take Bible Study on-the-road. This way we could get more people involved and have a more lively Bible Study. And that vision has seemed to work. It has been a win-win for the residents at the Manor and the members of Our Saviour who participate in Bible Study. In the same way, by conducting worship at the Manor, it can also be a win-win for both parties. The residents at the Manor can receive Communion and members from Our Saviour have another option for worship. So, I put this other worship time out there for you to consider, particularly if you have been unable to worship in person or virtually. Again, opportunities for worship are what we need to keep in mind. I pray that everyone who wants to worship then, will indeed find a means to do so.



A Word on Stewardship

This month the church remembers Martin Luther who died on February 18th. Luther is important for he taught us what it means to be righteous before God. Luther said, "The righteousness of God is that by which the righteous live by a gift of God, namely, by faith."

This month is also Black History Month. So, this month is also a most appropriate time to talk about what justice means. My dictionary defines justices as "fairness," "reward or penalty as deserved," and "the administration of law."

In the New Testament the Greek word δικαιοσύνη stands for both justice and righteousness. So, according to the Bible, to be just is to be righteous. To be a righteous person is to be one who stands for justice. Now, righteousness and justice are very "heady" terms. There is a lot contained in those words. So, I have always found it helpful to define "righteousness" as simply "doing what is right." And justice means the same thing, "doing what is right."

As people, not just as Christian people, but as people in general, we are supposed to do what is right by our neighbor. We should not lie, or cheat, or defraud our neighbor. We should not speak ill, or defame, or slander our neighbor. We should not harm, or insult, or abuse our neighbor in any way. We should advocate for our neighbor. We should seek our neighbor's well-being. So, if we want to be seen as righteous before God, then we need to do what is right by our neighbor. Pure and simple.

When we think about being a good steward of God's grace, we must think about what it means to embody the righteousness of God. We must therefore think about what it means to do right by our neighbor. The people who have made a mark in history, people like Martin Luther, people like Martin Luther King, Jr., people like Malala Yousafzai, people like Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and others...these people have left a mark on history because they have done what is right by their neighbor. That is all God asks of us. Micah 6:8 states, "What does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Regina Jonas was the world's first ordained female rabbi. She was ordained in 1935 in Germany. However, before her there was Asenath Barzani, who some scholars consider to be the first female rabbi in Jewish history. Barzani was born in 1560 and died in 1670. She was a rabbinical scholar and poet. She lived in Kurdistan.

Antoinette Brown Blackwell was the first woman to be ordained a minister of a recognized denomination in the United States. She was ordained in 1853 within the Congregational Church. The first ordained female pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) was Elizabeth Alvina Platz. She was actually ordained within the Lutheran Church in America, the predecessor body of the ELCA. She was ordained in November 1970.

Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Saviour Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting Tuesday, December 14, 2021

Members Present: Pastor Joel Petruschke, President Anneke Fleming, Vice President Brad Neil, Treasurer Jim Lubrecht, Secretary via Zoom, Jeanette Logan and Jared Copeland.

Members Absent: Penny Zimmerman

The meeting opened with Prayer at 6:32 pm.

A motion to approve and accept the minutes as edited from the council meeting on November 10, 2021 was made by Pastor Joel and seconded by Brad Neil. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Jim reported that the expenses have been updated to the end of December 2021. There was conversation regarding the bill for livestreaming our church services. Jim paid the bill of \$1,188.00 for 2022 which is a year's subscription for the service. The question was asked if there is a possibility of paying monthly for the service? Jeanette was asked to ask Herb if there is an option for a monthly payment. In addition, does Herb have a copy of the invoice?

Jim made a motion to add a line item to the Budget for 2022 under Worship and Music to reflect the streaming service cost. The line item will be listed as, "Live Stream Services." The motion was seconded by Jared. Motion carried.

Anneke asked Jim to supply a notation of the mutual funds and all other monies in the monthly Treasurer's Report.

Pastor Joel mentioned that he and Jim composed a letter for the congregation and included it in the newsletter. This letter gives the congregation a status of our financial situation.

The Treasurer's report is filed for audit.

Secretary's Report: Jeanette advised the council that the minutes from the January 2021 Congregational Meeting as well as the minutes from the Congregational Meeting in September 2021 were provided to Barb, our church Secretary, as well as Anneke and Pastor Joel. These minutes will be made available to members of the congregation at our upcoming Congregational Meeting in January 2022.

Committee Reports:

Christian Education:

- Pastor Joel mentioned he is holding an adult Sunday School class that meets after the church service and is held twice a month. There have been 6 members who have been in attendance.
- Confirmation class is still meeting every Thursday. Our Saviour's two students are scheduled to be confirmed
 on Pentecost Sunday 2022. The two students from Epiphany are Braden and Tommy and they still have
 another year of confirmation instruction. Pastor Joel is not sure he will continue their instruction or if their
 Interim Pastor (or called Pastor if Epiphany has one by then) will complete their instruction. The students have

been very faithful about attendance to the Zoom meetings and Pastor Joel continues to encourage the students to complete their sermon summaries. Overall, he is pleased with the students' progress and he has enjoyed working with them.
