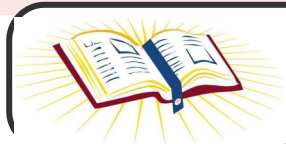

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This month begins our “war” with sin. Actually, we are always at “war” with sin. We acknowledge as much at the beginning of worship every Sunday during the Order of Confession and Forgiveness. But this month we are even more cognizant of the fact that we are at “war” with sin, because this month begins the season of Lent. Yes, Ash Wednesday is February 22nd, and so then begins our 40-day journey of Lent.

Lent is that time of year when we enter an intentional period of repentance. We fast, we pray, we give alms (practice generosity), all in the effort to cleanse ourselves of sin. Yes, Lent is about our personal “war” with sin. But Lent also reminds us of our collective “war” with sin. For, to be sure, humanity has been battling sin throughout human history.

At present, I have been reading a book entitled *The Handy History Answer Book* (1999, Visible Ink Press). And there is a specific chapter entitled “Wars, Overthrows, and Revolutions.” And I was reminded in this book of just how much our human history has been punctuated by violence and war. There, of course, was World War I and II. There was the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. There was the Spanish-American War, the Mexican War, the War of 1812. There was the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and the Persian Gulf War. There were the Boer Wars. There were the Napoleonic wars. There was the Sino-Japanese War. So on and so forth. Our human history has been an unfortunate narrative of ongoing unrest and violence. And even now, our world is watching a horrific war in Eastern Europe unfold, as Russia and Ukraine do battle.

I think about our human history and I am reminded of Primo Levi’s theory that when one group of people looks upon another group of people as “the other” to the point where that first group of people sees that other group as a threat, well, that is when bad things happen, like violence and war. And unfortunately, this has been hardwired into humanity for eons, all the way back to the time when human beings existed in disparate groups of hunter-gatherers, and the mindset was that we destroy “the other” group first and ask questions later, because it was about survival. So, this mindset is hardwired into our very being.

But the good news is that we can undo that hardwiring in our human psyche. We can undo that mindset. If epigenetics has taught us anything it is the fact that we can actually change our genes and pass those changes down from one generation to the next. We can undo this human instinct to see another group as “the other,” and see them then in a new light, as “us” together.

So, for me, Lent and really all of our spiritual lives is about this. It is about changing our mindset. We are at “war” with sin, and the process of reconciliation with one another and with God is what we are to be about as people of faith. It may take a long time to get there, because sin has been so hardwired into us, and with each new war it only reinforces that “us versus them” mindset. But, I do believe we can get there, and I do believe this is why the Lenten journey and the faith journey as a whole is so important. The journey we make together in love is the process of disentangling the sin that grips us and all people.

So, I hope your Lenten journey is a blessing to your life this year. I hope you continue to work to be reconciled to God and to those in your life with whom you may be estranged. And we look to the day when the peace of God which surpasses all understanding encompasses all of human life and creation. Thanks be to God.

About Worship

The preferred color for the day of Ash Wednesday is black. Purple is the alternative. We use purple at Our Saviour, because we don't have black paraments. But the color black is meant to remind us of the ashes that are used on Ash Wednesday. The ashes are a reminder of that to which all things must return. Everything returns to carbon dust. I also equate that image to Black Holes, where everything is consumed by gravity so that nothing is left but mass.

In the church year, Ash Wednesday is the most solemn of all days, even more solemn than Good Friday where the mood is one of subdued rejoicing in the victory won on the cross. Ash Wednesday is solemn because of the stark consequence of sin. "We are dust and to dust we shall return," pretty much sums up Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday gives us a very, VERY bleak vision to be sure.

But even on Ash Wednesday there is a glimmer of hope. The ashes imposed on our foreheads is made in the sign of a cross. It reminds us of the mark that is put upon Cain after he has risen up and destroyed his brother Abel. After Cain is condemned to exile to wander the earth, God takes mercy on him. Cain bemoans his punishment crying out to God that everyone will want to kill him. Everyone on earth will want revenge upon him for having killed Abel. And so God places a mark on Cain as a sign of protection. Thanks be to God.

Ash Wednesday is like that for us, too. Like Cain, we feel helpless and destitute in light of the consequence of our sinful actions. We feel cut off from God, cut off from every and any help. And then a mark is made on our foreheads like Cain. Ashes are imposed on us in the shape of a cross, and we are reminded that we are not without hope and protection. Even though we die as a consequence of sin, yet we will live. That is the Good News of Ash Wednesday. Yes, Ash Wednesday is a most horrible and solemn day of the church year, when we see vividly the consequence of sin. And yet, there is a glimmer of hope. Thanks be to God.

A similar feeling as that felt on Ash Wednesday, though, is what we experience on Good Friday. On Good Friday, during worship, the power of darkness consumes the sanctuary as every light is turned off and every candle extinguished. Except, the large paschal candle remains lit, and then is recessed out of the sanctuary. That is really the equivalent of Ash Wednesday, when the reminder of ash consumes our being, and yet there is a little light still shining, which is the image of the cross on our foreheads. So, in effect, Ash Wednesday connects very nicely with Good Friday. In short, there is always the hope of God even in the midst the most dire of situations. Thanks be to God.

A Word on Stewardship

I want to talk about a word that often is associated with stewardship and that word is “growth.” You see, we often associate stewardship with the notion of increasing the number of dollars in the offering plate or increasing the number of people in the pews. We often see stewardship as growing the budget or growing church membership. And although these are very important things when it comes to growth, there is something else that we need to remember. Stewardship is also about the growth of an individual with respect to that person’s relationship with God.

You see, here is the question I think each one of us needs to ask ourselves all along our faith lives: “Am I growing in my relationship with God?” Another way to ask that question is by asking these questions:

- Am I growing in my understanding and knowledge of God?
- Am I growing in my love toward my neighbor?
- Am I growing in my prayer life?
- Am I growing in my sense of gratitude for all the good gifts I enjoy in life?
- Am I growing in my sense of trust in God?
- Am I growing in my peace of mind?
- Am I growing in my service toward others?

And if we cannot answer “yes” to these questions, we need to ask ourselves “why”?

You see, so often we get caught up in “numbers” with respect to the church budget and church membership, and so often then we devote so much time and energy to these things, that we fail to care for the spiritual well-being of those in our midst including ourselves. Indeed, the investment we should be making toward the maintenance of the church is the care of our very own souls. And by doing that, I think we do reap benefits in terms of the budget and members. For there is something to be said for the witness of a church whose members who are 100% dialed into the Gospel. That witness is infectious. It will likely increase giving because we are more inclined to give to an institution in which we are fully committed, and it will likely increase membership because others will want to be a part of an organization in which they see the light of God in its members. So growing our relationship with God I do think is key.

And so how do we do that? Well, I am a big believer in the phrase, “If you act enthusiastic, you’ll be enthusiastic.” In other words, if we devote ourselves with at the very least “pretend” passion, over time that “pretend” passion becomes real passion, because it becomes habit, and habit transforms us by its constant practice. So, if we decide to be at worship every week, and if we decide to attend Adult Sunday School and Bible Study regularly, and if we pray each and every day, and if we work on loving and serving our neighbor, well, then I think we will change, not in a day or even a week. But over time, we will notice it, and we and the church community and the world will be the better for it. So, commit yourself to growing in your relationship with God.

Jesus Said, “Let the Little Children Come to Me.”

What is Santiago de Compostela?

Dear Interested Individual,

It is funny you should ask this, because I was reading about this in my preparations to travel to Spain. For you see, Santiago de Compostela is a town in northwestern Spain. Its claim to fame is that it is the site of the shrine of Saint James, who was the brother of Jesus Christ and who was the head of the early church in Jerusalem. That is why he is significant to Christian believers still today.

The shrine of St. James is now in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, which is the culmination of the Way of St. James, a leading Catholic pilgrimage route since the 9th century. Indeed, the Way of St. James has ranked in comparison to the pilgrimages Christians have made over the centuries to Jerusalem where Jesus was crucified and raised, and to St. Peter's Basilica in Rome where Peter is interred, and which is the capitol of Catholicism. Yes, for some time, these three have been the three great holy sites in Christianity. St. Peter's in Rome and the Holy City of Jerusalem are both well-known. But who knew about Santiago de Compostela?

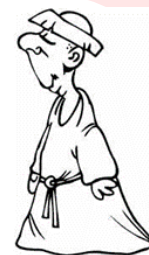

Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Saviour Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting Wednesday, December 14, 2022

Members Present: Pastor Joel Petruschke, Antonetta Fleming, President, Brad Neil, Vice-President, Jim Lubrecht, Treasurer, Jeanette Logan, Secretary, Steve Barrons and Penny Zimmerman.

Members Absent: Dawne Veet

At 6:38 pm Anneke called the meeting to order.

The minutes from the Council Meeting on 11-9-2022 were edited and approved. Penny made a motion to accept the minutes as edited and Brad seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Jim reviewed the financial reports with Council.

Budget Performance - The current deficit is \$28,586.84 compared to last year at this time when the deficit was \$39,901.37. Jim informed Council that this decrease can be contributed to this year's egg making profits as well as money made from our Germanfest event this year.

Jim explained to Council that November of 2022 was the first month in 2022 that we are in the black.

Mutual Funds - The mutual funds are continuing to grow.

The Treasurer's Report was filed for audit.

Secretary's Report: Jeanette informed Council that she sent thank you notes to Andrea Faber and Sandy Moritz for their assistance with the bake sale that was held at the church on Election Day in November, 2022.

Pastor's Report: A report was submitted and reviewed by Council

Our Saviour Employee Contracts: Jim will supply Council with a copy of Pastor Joel and Barb Johnson's current contracts.

Old Business:

Covid Task Force: Brad made a motion to disband the Covid Task Force and Penny seconded the motion. The motion carried. Jeanette will send thank you notes to the members of the committee, (Carol, Hope, Marcia, Brad and Victor) thanking them for their work on this committee.

Church Attendance Statistics: Jim will talk with Barb Johnson about gathering church attendance numbers on a monthly basis.

Property: Steve Barron will be the assistant to Brad on the Property Committee. Brad informed Council that he purchased new bulbs for the 4 lights that haven't been working. Two of the lights are now working and the other two lights should be working soon. He noted that Billy Youngblood has been helping him with the lighting issues and it was determined that a breaker had been tripped. Jeanette will send a note to Billy thanking him for his time and assistance.

Visioning Meeting: Pastor Joel was asked to provide the results of the Visioning Meetings to Council so these results may be prioritized.

Roof Shingles: Brad will call Sheetz Roofing about the missing shingles noting they will be replaced free of charge.

New Business:

Budget for 2023: Jim reviewed each line item of the 2023 budget with Council.

Secretary's Salary: Per a conversation that Pastor Joel had with our secretary Barb, she stated she would prefer more vacation days over a raise in pay. Jim made a motion to give Barb an additional 2 days of paid vacation. Steve seconded the motion. Jeanette amended the motion to give Barb 3 days of paid vacation. Penny seconded the amended motion. The amended motion is 3 days paid vacation for Barb. The motion carried.

Christian Education: Jim informed Council that Christian Education doesn't currently have a budget because the remainder of the Ruth Knerr donation to Christian Education of \$1,519.39 can be used.

Electric Heat and Gas: The budget is now \$8,500.00. up \$500.00.

Heating Contract: There was discussion that perhaps we should switch to a one time per year service call for heat and then the following year there would be a service call for the air conditioning.

Pest Control: There was discussion to have Orkin visit every four months.

Pastor's Salary: Brad made the following motion, "That after prayerful consideration, due to our church's financial instability and the fact that we have gone down to one Sunday service, I move that we are unable to give Pastor a raise at this time due to our uncertain financial future. " Jim seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Scholarships: Jim reviewed the actuarial tables for the scholarships with Council.

Organist Salary: Steve made a motion to keep Mitchell's salary at the current rate. Brad seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Penny made a motion to accept the 2023 Budget as presented by Jim. Brad seconded the motion. The motion carried.

At 10:45 pm the meeting was adjourned.

The next Council Meeting will be held on Wednesday, January 11, 2023 at 6:30 pm.

Monday - Team Leader, Nancy Pinko; Thursday - Team Leader, Pastor Joel; Saturday - Team Leader, Nadine Martin; Sunday - Team - Alice Lubrecht. If you are on a team but are unable to be at your team's scheduled egg-making session, please let your team leader know. All volunteers are asked to adhere to the following safety protocols:

Team Leaders are responsible for logging their team's attendance in the attendance log for each egg making session.

All volunteers are required to wear a hairnet or hat.

All volunteers must wear a full bib apron or smock to cover street clothes.

All volunteers are required to wash their hands in the hand washing sink prior to starting any egg-making tasks.

All volunteers must wear plastic gloves. Should gloves become soiled, torn, or contaminated, gloves must be discarded and replaced with a new set

No eating or drinking permitted in areas where eggs are being processed.

All touch points within the kitchen and social hall must be sanitized at the conclusion of the egg making session.
